

WEST VIRGINIA HUMANITIES COUNCIL ANNOUNCES 2017 FELLOWSHIP AWARDS

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Charleston – The West Virginia Humanities Council recently awarded nine new fellowships. The \$2,500 grants are awarded annually to college faculty and independent scholars for research and writing projects in the humanities. The Humanities Council offers a variety of grants to nonprofit organizations that support educational programming and budgets nearly \$700,000 for grants and programs each year. Humanities Council fellowships, unique in West Virginia, are among its most competitive offerings.
