In 2017, Humanities Council grants and programs served tens of thousands of West Virginians through lectures, programs and events, the West Virginia Book Festival, scholarly research and travel, documentaries, publications and e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia.

◀ Our video of broom maker James Shaffer went viral on the Internet, was featured by West Virginia Public Broadcasting, and shown at the Library of Congress.

Humanities Council grants funded exhibits by the West Virginia Railroad Museum and the Appalachian Forest Heritage Area at Darden Mill in Elkins.

We funded the symposium "Humanities in the 21st Century," a collaborative project between Shepherd University and the National Conservation Training Center.

WVU public history students furthered their education at the historic MacFarland-Hubbard House, Humanities Council headquarters.

The Humanities Council funded a Marshall University summer institute, with field trips to train educators to teach black history.

We partnered with McArts to host a concert with songwriter Elaine Purkey at Ya'sou Greek Restaurant in McDowell County.

We partnered with the National Archives to present a special Bill of Rights exhibit at 41 sites across West Virginia.

We supported a Jefferson County project to transcribe letters from former slaves who immigrated to Liberia in the 19th century.

The documentary, Vietnam: West Virginians Remember, was made possible by a Humanities Council grant.

We launched the West Virginia Folklife Apprenticeship Program, with support from the National Endowment for the Arts.

In 2017 the Humanities Council awarded 48 grants in 18 counties throughout the state.

We recorded interviews in 15 counties as part of our folklife fieldwork.

Nine fellowships were awarded to researchers in Morgantown, Huntington and elsewhere.

Our folklorist met with interested citizens in Sandyville, Ripley, Berkeley Springs, Glenville and elsewhere.

The Humanities Council supported an archaeological dig in Green Bank to analyze 18th-century frontier defense.

A Humanities Council grant supported an oral history project documenting 1950's public schools integration in Mount Hope.

A major grant supported an exhibit and weeklong program at Pricketts Fort on the African American experience on the Virginia frontier.

We partnered with the Southern Foodways Alliance to document the traditional foodways of the Swiss community of Helvetia.

Humanities Council funds supported the History and Folklore Festival at Marshall County's Grand Vue Park.

"This Week in West Virginia History," originating from e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia, airs twice daily on West Virginia Public Radio and appears as a weekly column in many newspapers.

We presented 141 *History Alive* living history programs in 44 counties with portrayals of historical figures such as reporter Nellie Bly (JoAnn Peterson of Kingwood). •

Council staff took part in dedicating the John Henry Park at the Great Bend Tunnel in Talcott.

West Virginia Humanities Council grants funded 120 events statewide in West Virginia.

• We supported the return of director John Sayles for the 30th anniversary of *Matewan,* his movie about the West Virginia Mine Wars.

We hosted a free concert at the MacFarland-Hubbard House with Summers County old-time musician Jim Costa and University of North Carolina folklorist Zoe van Buren.

Our popular Little Lectures included talks on World War I, Shakespeare, West Virginians in country music, and Wood County's historic Henderson Hall.

Dea It m year, better

and Annual Honor Rol

Dear Friends:

It might be a stretch to call 2017 an outstanding year, but I'm pleased to report that things worked out better than expected under challenging circumstances. Considerably better, in fact.

This was the year we took a \$200,000 cut in state

funding, fully believing we'd have to cover a six-figure deficit out of our modest reserves — that, or slash programming or fire people.

Facing such choices, our board decided to risk the deficit. Humanities Council bylaws wisely stipulate a balanced budget, so we pledged reserves up to the full amount needed to make ends meet.

The risk played out, fortunately, as through a combination of market growth of invested reserves, increased fundraising and old-fashioned belt tightening we trimmed the shortfall by more than three-fourths. We also benefitted by an unanticipated and very welcome increase in federal funding for the humanities. The upshot was to whittle the deficit to manageable size.

Most importantly, we were able to maintain a full humanities effort statewide while keeping our financial affairs in order. You'll find further details in the following pages, but here's our year's work in a nutshell: We awarded 48 grants and nine fellowships, and supported more than

300 programs and events in 49 counties. We were pleased that the National Endowment for the Arts expanded its support for our recently

begun folklore program, and our folklorist was active in 19 counties. *e-WV*, our online encyclopedia, continued to carry the West Virginia story across the country and worldwide. And we closed the year with an outstanding McCreight Lecture in the Humanities before a big crowd in Charleston.

Saying all this, I hasten to add that that "manageable" deficit still exceeded \$40,000, a significant amount for an organization the size of ours. We got it down to that level largely through the generosity of donors, and we urge you to continue your financial support in this new year. You'll find a contributions envelope tucked into this report!

And in speaking of reduced state funding, let me make it clear that the State of West Virginia continues to provide a much-appreciated \$250,000 to the Humanities Council. We're mindful of state budget woes and grateful that scarce resources are entrusted to our stewardship. Like others we're encouraged by the recent uptick in state revenues and improvements to the economy, and we look forward to working with decision makers to continue — and ideally improve — funding for the humanities.

Where the money came from... The National Endowment for the Humanities, a federal agency, remains our largest source of income. The NEH provided \$684,700, or 52 percent of total income in 2017, up from \$658,630 (47 percent) the previous year. The West Virginia Office of the Secretary of National Endowment Education and the Arts provided \$250,000, down \$200,000 from 2016 and 19 percent of total income. The State of West Virginia remaining \$368,177 or 29 percent came largely from the All Other Sources private sector, including individual gifts and corporation and foundation support, plus \$20,000 from the National Endowment for the Arts. ...and where the money went. In 2017, 61 percent of Humanities Council expenses went to programs and grants, 26 percen



to administration, and six percent to development. We were pleased to see decreases in the portion going to administration and development, and note that one-time expenditures on real estate increase the value of Council property.

Looking back, our finances turned out better than expected in 2017. As state funding fell, we scrambled to offset the loss through funds from other sources and to limit damage to programming.

Looking forward, with state support remaining at the reduced level of \$250,000, our board approved a budget of \$1,321,300 for fiscal year 2018. This is \$26,482 less than was spent the previous year. A combination of belt tightening and spending of reserves will allow us to continue full programming as we seek to regain lost funds.

The figures and charts shown here are based on actual, unaudited financial information as reported internally to management and the board of directors. The West Virginia Humanities Council is audited annually by an independent auditor, with each year's audit available for public inspection by April of the following year. Fiscal year 2017 ended October 31.
