Easels can be extended for floor display, or used at minimum height on tabletops.





Assembly and packing instructions are included with the exhibit.

The "posters" have been printed by the Council on semi-rigid PVC, a plastic-like substrate that is much more durable than foamcore. It is waterproof and can be cleaned with water or gentle soap in the event of smudges or spills on the material.

While easels have been provided, if desired the posters can also be propped with minimal support on existing shelves in your venue. Please do not add hanging hardware or alter the posters themselves in any way. Contact the Council with any questions.

TRANSPORT

Do not attempt to transport the materials outside their included bags/cases.

The Council prefers that host organizations pick up exhibit materials from our offices in Charleston. However, additional options are available. Council staff travels the state frequently, and a hand-off closer to your location might be possible. If the exhibit must shipped, the Council will invoice your organization for the exact cost.
